

**2010 CONSOLIDATED APPEAL - UGANDA**

**Monitoring Report for January - April**  
**ADJUMANI DISTRICT (WEST NILE)**

**OVERVIEW, PRIORITY GAPS, ACTIONS REQUIRED:**

LCIs registered 376 PSN/EVIs among the remaining 12,000 IDPs in Adjumani district. During the reporting period, UNHCR and the Danish Refugee Council (DRC) embarked on re-verification of Persons with Special Needs (PSNs) to be supported with shelter in areas of return. By end of April 2010, 82 PSNs in urgent need of shelter were identified and preparations for construction are underway. Construction activities for the remaining 300 PSNs will take place during the dry season (November and December 2010). To contribute to sustainability of durable solutions, water points and livelihood programmes are planned in return areas subject to the timely availability of adequate resources. None of the eight IDP camps in Adjumani has been closed. The district needs to be supported to manage the camp phase-out process by establishing, leading and coordinating activities of Camp Phase Out Committees.

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**BUNYORO REGION-WESTERN UGANDA**

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**OVERVIEW, PRIORITY GAPS, ACTIONS REQUIRED:**

Masindi district hosts about 55,000 IDPs. Results of a November 2009 Local Government-UNHCR Assessment indicate that of these, about half (23,000) prefer local integration as their durable solution, with the remainder undecided. The assessment also highlighted the existence of land disputes between IDPs and host communities; conflicts around inadequate basic services; cases of Sexual & Gender Based Violence (SGBV), notably women battering, defilement, rape, and early/forced marriages; and lack of targeted and specialised support to EVIs/PSNs.

The above protection and recovery gaps in host and IDP communities underscore the need to: coordinate, reinforce and scale up mass information campaigns and key messages around sustainable durable solutions, gender and SGBV; consolidate presence and coverage of UHRC and ICLA activities; invest in improving access to essential services as per PRDP strategic objectives and priority programmes; and target support to EVIs/PSNs, particularly the weakest and poorest.

Critical ingredients to making significant progress in above sectors and in effectively supporting the process towards sustainable durable solutions are: (i) robust local government leadership, coordination and attention to above sectors; (ii) stronger strategic and material support from central government, humanitarian and development actors; and (iii) advocating for robust, coordinated, effective and timely responses to assessed critical humanitarian and recovery gaps.

Number of PSN/EVIs supported to achieve durable solution	<b>MAJOR GAPS:</b>	There are no coordinated and targeted responses targeting EVIs/PSNs, thus it is difficult to quantify and qualify progress. However, a key message of mass information campaigns is for IDP and host communities to care for and support PSNs/EVIs to also achieve sustainable durable solutions, particularly the weakest and poorest.  There is need for a verification exercise to update EVI/PSN records and to ascertain actual numbers and desired solution. Local government needs to take the lead and play a more active role in coordinating, advocating and prioritizing humanitarian and PRDP responses.
Number of camps closed/ transformed into viable communities	<b>UNABLE TO MEET TARGET</b>	There are no IDP camps in western Uganda; IDPs live together with host communities.
